What we expect

At Cotteridge School we are working hard to promote good attendance. Our basic expectation for each pupil is at least 96% attendance.

Benefits of Good School Attendance

Children with good attendance:

- ✓ Achieve more academically and keep up with work more easily
- ✓ Feel happier and gain in confidence
- ✓ Develop well socially, and find it easier to make and keep friends
- ✓ Establish good educational habits and routines at an early age
- ✓ Are able to make a positive contribution to school life in general

All of these are important life skills for your child.



How we reward good attendance.

There is a strong emphasis on good attendance at Cotteridge School.



We reward good attendance every Monday at assembly by year groups:

- ✓ Y1 and Y2 have 'Attendance Ted'
- ✓ Y3 to Y6 have 'Registration Reg'

At the end of each academic year we award an Individual Attendance Certificate to children who have 100% and 99% attendance.





Holidays during school term time

Since the Supreme Court's judgment that children cannot be permitted to take term time holidays, Birmingham City Council has introduced measures to possibly fine or prosecute parents who take their children on holidays without authorisation. Such authorisation can only be given by a Headteacher in extremely exceptional circumstances. Therefore we strongly advise parents not to make any holiday bookings in term time. The potential possible fine for doing so is £60 per child per parent per week.

Punctuality

It is important that children arrive on time for school so that they can learn more effectively and not disrupt others.

Please note that the school day begins at 9.00am. Doors open from 8.50am. If you child arrives after 9.00am, he/she will be marked late.



What will happen if your child is late?

- 5 minutes late → Late mark
- 20 minutes late → Unauthorised absence

Unauthorised illness absence

We will not authorise absence for illness such as: A mild stomach ache, headache, cough or sniffles.



If you are in doubt, please send your child into school while informing their class teacher or the school office so we can monitor them throughout the day.

If you child is too unwell to remain in school, the school office will contact you. Please ensure you inform the school office if you change your phone numbers.

What will happen if your child takes an unauthorised absence?

- If your child does not arrive to school → You will be contacted by phone or text
- 5 days unauthorised absence → Attending meetings at school to discuss the issue with Mrs Burnett
- Continual unauthorised absence → Referred to 'Spotlight on Attendance' Action Group.

Absences due to illness

Last year, too many school absences were due to illness. We understand there are times when children are clearly not well enough to be in school. However there are also many times when they are kept off with minor illnesses when they could have coped in school.

Authorised illness absence

We will authorise absence for infectious diseases, vomiting, diarrhoea and high temperature.

If your child has 5 or more days of absence due to illness, we will ask you for evidence for any further illness absences. Examples of evidence may include:

- ⇒ Medical appointment letter or card
- ⇒ A note from your doctor
 - ⇒ A copy of a prescription

If you are unable to provide the school with any of the above, the absences will not be authorised. Your child may be referred to our School Nurse. We may also refer your child to the school nurse if we are concerned about his/her health and

Other authorised absences



There are a number of other reasons when you may feel that you need to keep your child at home.

However, only a handful of these reasons are likely to be authorised absences. Some examples that we would be able to authorise include:

- ⇒ A hospital or emergency appointment, please provide a copy of your appointment slip. We do however hope that you would endeavour to make all appointments out of the school day.
- ⇒ A religious observance - absence may be authorised, for one day on each occasion, for pupils to attend relevant religious observances. For example, we will authorise one day for a child whose family is celebrating Eid when this falls during term time.
